IN MEMORIAM: MILDRED WRIGHT

On July 29, 2014, we lost another stalwart emeritus member of JCHC. Mildred Wright, former coordinator of the commission, also known as the “Cemetery Lady”, left these parts glory-bound to seek answers to questions she could not locate in any archives or on headstones in the many cemeteries she documented throughout southeast Texas. An ardent genealogist, Mildred was a member of the Southeast Texas Genealogical Society.

Mildred and her husband, Zelma, made Beaumont their home in 1967, and she joined the commission in the early 1970’s. Her work included marker narratives for the sub-courthouse, the Rainbow Bridge, and the Prisoner of War camp in China, as well as maintaining the mini-museum in the Courthouse. Her most significant work was the publication of several cemetery volumes documenting the location, history, and burials in each. This work has been an invaluable tool to historic researchers, and will continue to be a definitive resource for many years to come.

Mildred was honored with an Award of Merit in Historic Preservation from the Texas Historical Commission for her efforts in uncovering and preserving historic cemeteries. Mildred’s funeral services were held at Broussard’s on McFaddin in Beaumont and burial followed at Magnolia Cemetery. Many members of the commission were on hand to honor her memory and celebrate her life. Her friends and colleagues will miss her quiet dignity and her passion for cemetery preservation.

**GALVESTON HISTORICAL FOUNDATION'S 1940 SEARS BUILDING
TO HOST OPEN HOUSE AND NEON LIGHTING CELEBRATION**

Galveston Island, Texas, September 8, 2014 – What began as Galveston Island's Sears and Roebuck store is now home to one of GHF's more public endeavors. To celebrate the recent exterior restoration work as well as the recently installed neon sign, we're inviting the public for a day of vintage fun at our 1940 Sears's Building, located at 2228 Broadway, on Saturday, September 13th.

From noon until 4 p.m., the Sears Building will be transformed to a 1940's scene with a classic car show, costume contest, treats, beverages and more all afternoon. Admission is free to the public. The neon sign, recently installed in the same location as the original Sears sign, will be turned on at 8:30 p.m. that evening. GHF purchased the building in late 2012, and set to work immediately with numerous updates and restoration projects. The latest round of rehabilitation work is restoring the exterior of the building back to its 1940's glamour. The location is home to numerous GHF programs including its Architectural Salvage Warehouse, Center for Coastal Heritage, Preservation and Conservation Services and also offers space to related small businesses and non-profits.

"GHF's presence on Broadway is a major step forward to improve the appearance of the street and increase our visibility," states GHF Executive Director Dwayne Jones. "We are very excited about the installation of a new neon sign much like the historic Sears sign from the 1940s. The brilliant neon, and restoration work of the building itself, will make a strong statement for GHF and improve Broadway as an entrance to the downtown."

**PAUL TANNER'S PASSION FOR
ARCHEOLOGY REMEMBERED
JCHC MINI-MUSEUM
SEPTEMBER, 2014**

Each year the Texas Historical Commission, along with the Jefferson County Historical Commission (JCHC), celebrate October as Texas Archeology Month. It is also appropriate that this is the month we are celebrating the life of former member Paul Tanner who passed away in January of this year. For many years, Paul served as the Archeology Chair for the JCHC.

Paul, an amateur scientist, helped preserve Texas Prehistory. His records and collection of artifacts from McFaddin Beach are permanently curated at the Texas Archeological Research Laboratory in Austin. Some of his personal finds

were also donated to the Jefferson County Historical Commission archives.

Paul, a quiet gentle man, will be greatly missed.

Many thanks to JCHC member Brenda Jackson, Volunteer Archeological Steward, for her hard work in putting the mini-museum exhibit together which includes photos of Paul with his collections and documentation of his many archeology finds on McFaddin Beach.

The exhibit will be on display until the restoration of the first floor of the courthouse gets underway.
